# **Recipient Highlights**

### Providence Farm Collective

Project Name: Preserving & Sharing Refugee, Immigrant & Black Farmers' Culture, Tradition &

History through Arts

The project will result in an exhibition and book that use various forms of art and storytelling to catalog the cultural importance of food to the communities. The project will improve equitable representation in the local arts sector, helping a diverse community of intergenerational refugee, immigrant and Black participants engage in art, be seen as artists within their immediate community, and extend their presence and voices into the



wider art community. The project will create life-sized cyanotype farm family portraits in fall 2022. Families will lay themselves and their crops on light sensitive fabric. The fabrics will hold a relief image of the families and symbols of farm life. The images will be exhibited and be the symbolic starting point for the larger project.



### Neto Hatinakwe Onkwehowe, Inc.

**Project Name:** *Native Visions* 

Neto will exhibit a show of Native American art work at the Unity Gallery on Delaware Ave. Buffalo, NY 14216, September - October 31 2022. Neto will also set up Native American art and cultural events to display Native American art and traditional wampum belts that have been made by Native American artists. The cultural events will take place during the fall of 2022 and spring of 2023.

These events will be held at Cattaraugus Seneca territory and Tuscarora territory and in the urban cities of Niagara Falls and Buffalo. Neto attended and set up at these events pre-pandemic and now hopes to re-engage with their communities. This project impacts the local art scene by allowing people to see authentic Native American art from a truly underserved community.

# Rural Outreach Center

Project Name: ROC'n Creation Station

This project will provide opportunities for rural families to learn about and engage in the creation of fine arts. Opportunities to experience art culture in rural areas are limited by both geographic and financial accessibility. All the families engaged with The Rural Outreach Center are living in poverty and this project, ROC'n Creation Station, will provide them with the opportunity to experience fine arts regardless of these barriers.



As a part of this 8-week experience, our rural families will be invited to take part in a 2-hour arts education and creation experience that will incorporate a different medium of fine arts each week. These sessions will include painting, sculpture, drawing, jewelry making, and textiles. This 8-week experience will culminate in a community art show that will celebrate our families' creations and bring awareness to the importance of fine art experiences. Families will also be invited to take part in a day trip to one of Buffalo's art galleries where they will have the chance to learn about and engage with the rich art culture that Buffalo has to offer.
