



Following three years of analysis, planning, and discussion with school, district, college, and nonprofit leaders, the Cullen Foundation is proud to announce the launch of the new Buffalo Urban Teaching Fellows (BUTF) program to address increasingly acute local teacher shortages.

BUTF is designed to help community members interested in teaching find the right path for them, become successful teachers, and to address three systemic issues identified during that process:

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Diversity

A need for a more diverse teacher

Teacher Shortage

A need to find more teachers in shortage areas, including special education, bilingual/multilingual education, secondary math and science, and others 3



Location

A need to hire teachers committed to teaching in the city of Buffalo



TNTP, a national leader in teacher recruitment and development, will lead BUTF the first two years and then work to slowly turn the reins over to local partners by 2027. BUTF aims to recruit 225 new teachers to city of Buffalo schools, with a goal of recruiting cohorts that are at least 60% fellows of color. All fellows will first serve as residents in public schools that enroll students from Buffalo while earning master's degrees and obtaining their teaching certification. BUTF provides outreach recruitment, mentoring, wraparound services, and other supports to fellows.

Niagara University, Canisius College, Buffalo State University, and Relay Graduate School of Education will host and certify fellows during their residencies. Fellows will also be eligible for scholarship awards to offset tuition for these programs and will receive wraparound supports to help them succeed in the classroom.
