

WHY ARE PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT, MENTORING AND COACHING CRITICAL RESOURCES FOR EMERGING ARTS LEADERS AT PIVOTAL POINTS IN THEIR CAREERS?

"I think the main thing your realize at a certain point in your career, if you do any kind of self-reflection, is how much you don't know. The ability to dig into the wealth of information available through your peers, colleagues and mentors is a great gift. It is often one people feel uncomfortable asking someone for. Maybe because successful people seem so busy, or people are nervous to approach those they don't know for advice. But a mentor gains from these relationships as well, by asking them to dig into their accumulated experience and distill the information they have come to through lived experience. It is so useful to be given access to that chance to reflect and regurgitate what you know. It reminds you that you have answers and, when you don't, to look for them in similar ways. Emerging leaders challenge the status quo. They ask good, hard questions with an eye to the current realities. In the arts, that refreshment of ideas is a constant need, and those conversations help guide the future of our organizations into the future. We do not exist in vacuums. If we are not in constant dialogue with our field, we will be left behind. This kind of program incentivizes us to be in the conversation. It makes it easier."

WHAT ARE THE MOST IMPORTANT LEARNINGS AND PRACTICES THAT AN EMERGING ARTS LEADER WILL ACQUIRE FROM A PROGRAM LIKE CULLEN FELLOWS?

"Though they are a cohort, the beauty of this program is its ability to craft a bespoke learning experience for each of these emerging arts leaders. I hope they further develop their language skills, as language shapes our universe. And as leaders they are creating the space in which the work happens. I hope they're able to further refine their processes, understanding that meeting rooms are no different than the rehearsal halls – spaces in which devotion to technique and process to allow for creativity to flourish. And because leadership can be lonely, I hope the Fellows walk away with an improved ability to self-motivate, self-assess, and self-correct."
